

"Art", at it's simplest, is a play about three men. The purchase of a contemporary painting by one of the characters is the catalyst for them realizing that their relationship is no longer as it was in their youth. The play was originally cast with actors in their sixties and a few eyebrows were raised when I announced that I might consider about a younger casting. This was not me being intentionally provocative. It was more to do with the fact that I didn't see anything in the script which bound me to that initial premise. It was no surprise that such a clever and challenging play attracted a lot of quality auditionees but, ultimately, Matt, Colin and Andrew provided an interesting spark which hinted at a side of the play which I hadn't previously spotted. It is not about cantakerous old men, it is about identifying that life is suddenly not how it used to be and whether you accept it, find a way

to adjust to it or fight it. With a young cast, whose characters' responses come from a place of discovery rather than a place of experience, we have a play which will excite people who have already seen it performed, while also showing those who have never seen it before what all the fuss is about.

The play is automatically given a new lease of life by moving it into the intimate space of the NVT studio. The pressures of commercial theatre have


The awards themselves followed, with support from an enthusiastic audience. A list of the winners for each category follows.

The October Acting Classes Characterisation and Text Into Performance October 5, 12, 19 & 26

This set of four sessions will take participants into the processes of communicating a character's situation to an audience both physically and vocally by looking at 'story' and how the writer's story might then be told by actors.

Each class will be run in a way that fits all levels of experience and as a discrete unit - perfect for those either able to attend all or just one or two of the sessions.

You will be working on your own and in small groups. There will be opportunities to present work and gain feedback on performance. The intention is that it should be a learning, skills-based process - ideal for beginner or for those with more experience - that, by the end, will have provided you with more than you came in with.

meant that "Art" is used to being performed in 2'000 seat theatres with TV personalities filling the roles. While the play's commercial success of 15 years ago has allowed Yasmina Reza, its writer, more creative freedom in her subsequent work, you can't help wondering whether, once being an actor herself, she ever missed the opportunity to showcase three actors in close proximity to the audience, and watching the characters engage with them. At the New Venture

we get that opportunity. There is an undeniable magic when watching someone fight to understand what is happening to them from close quarters. In the studio, the play which is so much more about friendship than art anyway, becomes a dance - a sequence of tangos as each character attempts to manoeuvre their partner.

Working with the three actors rediscovering this play has been a very exciting process for me.

This is my first venture into directing and although I have been a set and costume designer fifteen years I am used to my creative involvement being virtually complete by the time rehearsals start. With this creative cast and my skilled backstage team I am proud to present a production which, we think, shows off the engaging simplicity of the studio space and the unique place that the New Venture occupies in Brighton theatre.

Dear Members,


