'Gaby Goes Global'

Gaby Goes Global is a new comedy by local award winning playwright Judy Upton; it was written last year and per-

formed for 3 nights at Wimbledon Theatre. As it is set in Brighton it seemed appropriate for a production to happen here.

Gaby is an employment advisor in Worthing who gets transferred to the Brighton Job Centre to cover for sickness. She is surprised that so many of her claimants are unemployed artists. This leads her to an idea that could be mutually beneficial to her and the unemployed artists she has met and a new meaning for the role of Job Club. How-

ever she doesn't plan for the full devious nature and entrepreneurial extremes of some of the group and without her knowledge she becomes an overnight worldwide celebrity.

This play has been an enjoyable and fun experience from the development side and we hope it will be at least equally fun and enjoyable for the audience. The play is based around adult themes, but should not be too shocking for most people, more tongue-in-cheek comments on some aspects of society and the way people are viewed.

The cast heralds some new faces to the NVT, as well as welcome returns and some new to our stage. Hannah Liebe-

skind takes on her first role with New Venture as Gaby ably supported by Imogen Miller-Porter - returning after a

VARIATION TO OUR LICENCE

The good news is that we have been granted the variation to our licence. It means we can now stage public performances again in our Upstairs (Main) Theatre. We intend to create an attractive flexible space. We will be able to keep the proscenium arch principle, but keep the performance and audience areas flexible. So with the seating movable, use of differing levels, we can create an exciting performance area.

The space is available now to use and with a bit of imagination and hard work we could stage events there now.

However we are forming a little team to get the refurbishment started.

MAIN THEATRE FUND RAISING PROJECT

Following on the success of the fund raising for the Fire Detection and Emergency Lighting Project,

What's going on behind the Green Door: Rebirth of the Main Theatre

Our much loved New Venture Theatre has played an important role in the creative and artistic life of Brighton and Hove since it started in the 1940s. In 1953 NVT opened the Main Theatre. Many will remember happy evenings in the theatre, which had a very special atmosphere.

In 2005 it was closed because of fire regulations and since then NVT has performed all its shows in the studio theatre on the ground floor. You will have heard the great news that a performance licence has been granted, and the old theatre is being reborn using a flexible and modern design, but retaining the possibility of creating a proscenium arch when required for individual shows.

From rebirth to reopening the theatre will cost around £20,000 to refurbish (and that's just phase 1). A small planning team has been set up to help raise the funds needed.

At the AGM on 17th November there will be an opportunity for members to give their views on this project.

And at our Christmas party on **Saturday 18th December** we will be using the occasion to launch the rebirth and show you the initial plans.

So save that date and come dressed to impress!

We are also planning a special gala event on **Saturday 9 April 2011** to help encourage other potential

benefactors to give individual or corporate sponsorship. We will be looking for 'Angels' to help our dream take flight. Our Angels will be able to put their names on a theatre seat in perpetuity for £100, More details will follow but save that date too – which will include 1950s entertainment.

Upcoming Acting Classes and Workshops

11, 18, 25 October and 1 November

Creation and Development of Character and Plot through Improvisation -- Steve Coulson

Learn how to invent a character from scratch, and build that character up into a fully realised, living, breathing personality that feels very comfortable to inhabit. Using emotional development, movement, and exploration of differing acting techniques your

character can then improvise naturally with other characters to create a short, scripted scene!

8th, 15th, 22nd, 29th November and 6th December

Characterisation and Text into Performance - Becoming an exquisite actor in five easy sessions —- Mark Wilson

This set of five sessions will take participants through the processes of communicating a character's situation to an audience, both physically and vocally, by looking at 'story' and how the writer's story might then be told by actors. Each class will be run in a way that fits all levels of experience and as a discrete unit - perfect for those able to attend all or just one or two of the sessions. You will be working on your own and in small groups. There will be opportunities to present work and gain feedback on performance but there will be no pressure to perform - process being more important than product. The intention is that it should be a learning, skills-based process, ideal for the 'beginner' as well as those with more experience. It is my intention that all of us shall leave the session with more than we came in with.

SOMETHING THAT HAPPENED

Seven Characters in Search of a Production

A Guest Review: 'Of Mice and Men' by Barry Hewlett-Davies

The original title of Steinbeck's Of Mice and Men was "Something That Happened" and something unexpected happened with this production. The director, Tim McQuillen-Wright, decided to have seven characters played by one man – Carl Boardman. It's a bold decision, brought about, perhaps, because it's easier to find one firstrate actor than seven. If I'm wrong about that, I apologise. The decision is valid artistically as well.

It works. More or less.

Carl is the entire staff of the Californian ranch in the American Depression of the 30s which is the setting for the action.

He is in the position (does anyone envy him?) of having to talk to himself, has to help himself up off the ground, and finally rounds himself up into a lynch mob. He does this by changing gloves, hats, walks and voices, and, thanks to his being brilliantly confident, he doesn't come over at all like a quick-change artist in old time music hall.

Whether the audience kept up with him at the performance I saw, is another matter. It is asking a lot, after all.

Of Mice and Men is one of those plays where disaster is inevitable. You know from the onset that no-one is going to win. This is its strength and the reason why it has lived and breathed so healthily for more than 70 years. George and Lennie's talk (George's mostly) about the good life just round the corner is not going to happen. It is the dream that keeps them alive. A dream that keeps us all alive, at the moment, come to think of it.

When I told a friend I was going to see the show, she sighed. "I couldn't bring myself to go," she said. "It's heartbreaking!" She's right. It is. But the grief is not depressing.

Andy Hutchison and Andy Bell are the two leads, Andy Hutchison the "tough" one. The thing about his performance is that he isn't tough. His relationship with his feeble (autistic?) mate is tender, supportive, generous,

and not looking for gain. When he kills Andy Bell to save him from the lynch mob, you accept there is nothing else he can do. It is the ultimate gift. His performance has genuine beauty and a remarkable stillness. You know exactly what he is thinking.

Andy Bell, big, blubbery and rabbit-fixated, does not go out out his way to ask for sympathy. He attracts it naturally and deserves it.

Hannah Brain has a pretty thankless job, the empty-head whose intrusion wrecks the lads' chances by accident. Hannah, voted Best Newcomer at the end of last season, is obviously an actor to watch.

Tim McQuillen-Wright gets a good atmosphere going in the studio. The final moments of his production are masterful.

John Steinbeck's dog ate the first draft of the play. Not a reliable critic, though he was responsible for Steinbeck's giving it a better title.

Fund raising - Auction of promises


We're planning a fundraising auction on 18th December and thought we'd focus on an auction of **PROMISES**, such as:
