SALOME

Originally translated by Lord Alfred Douglas, this has been adapted to include a male 'court' chorus and a poem from Wilde's collection. I place this story in a time period that is unknown to us — much like 'The Village' by M Night Shyamalan — we know we are witnessing a cult of some kind, but do we know the exact location, time? No. The premise of SALOME is determined by the male court, a united voice led by her Stepfather Herod — which is 'interrupted' with new information in the story to highlight women's fears of death — this exposes Wilde's language of 'sacrifice' as Cappa informs us, "In my country there are no woman left. There are some who say they have hidden themselves in the mountains, but I do not believe it."

The Page also voices her fears of death through Oscar Wilde's poem, 'Requiescat.'

This poem was selected to expose the fragility of the female characters and their lack of hope under the ruling of King Herod.

Salome's 'on show' presence in Act 1 is exhausting for her, as she is constantly watched and objectified by the male court, baring resemblance to the hopeless existence of the Vestal Virgin's from Rome. This is emulated through the beautiful spectacle you see, but this is far from the reality for Salome. In Jokanaan, Salome sees elements of herself, she questions his 'Prophet' Legacy and doubts the notion of him holding a curse. She is not afeared to look into his eyes but rather drawn to him — what is it that fascinates her so? Her freedom? Salome's obsession for Jokanaan was the vessel for Wilde's sexual desires and her ticket to holding her own voice in a world dominated by men.

The sounds of the public male court begin to fade, as the family's dynamic is exposed in private moments. Wilde implies that Herod feels his wife Herodias is incapable of providing him with children, and thus maybe seeking to fulfil his legacy through Salome. Herodias tries to protect her daughter but is hardened by her role as Herod's wife when she still seems to be grieving for her previous husband. Herodias must listen while Herod speaks unforgettable truths about his lustful desires towards Salome, barely disguising the language he choices to speak, using the moon as his loose shield, when the moon is indeed Salome. Unable to fulfil these desires he makes her consecrated, whilst continuing to request a dance from his daughter — The Seven Veils Dance. In this version, the Seven Veils dance is not focused on Herod's plan, but about the 'act' that Wilde places as a stage direction — the act for Salome to take back her power, her legacy, her identity.

This has been a wonderful script to explore with my team and our two wonderful Salome's – both actors bring a different interpretation not to be missed.

This show is dedicated to my late Grandmother Elsie Jane Moss.




